Groundbreaking for new parking lot paves the way— San Leandro High School begins major campus transformation

On October 23, at noon, San Leandro Unified School District Superintendent Christine Lim and the Board of Education were joined by local dignitaries, District staff, architects, project managers and community members for the groundbreaking of the new District Parking Lot at San Leandro High School, the first of several groundbreakings transforming the campus at San Leandro High School.

The former PG&E lot has remained vacant for years, with the exception of a few PG&E power towers. The ceremony began with a ceremonial passing of a gold shovel from PG&E's Public Affairs Manager Tom Guarino to Board of Education President Ray Davis.

"I cannot think of anything better for the use of this land," said Tom Guarino, "than to become part of our public education system."

Others who participated in the ceremonial groundbreaking included SLHS Principal Amy Furtado, Measure B Co-Chairs Deborah Cox (also Chair of the Citizens Oversight Committee) and Leroy Smith, Board Trustees Rick Richards, Linda Perry, Mike Katz, Pauline Cutter and Stephen Cassidy, San Leandro Interim City Manager Steve Hollister, City Councilmember Joyce Starosciak and Director of Bond & Measure B Projects Michael Murphy.

"The parking lot is the cornerstone of all our major Measure B projects," said Board

President Ray Davis, "essential to the completion of the Arts Education Center and the 9th Grade Campus." He added that the new parking lot would have 348 spaces, a net gain of more than 100 additional spaces, and have a positive impact on reducing student parking on neighborhood streets.

The parking lot, the Arts Education Center, and the 9th Grade Campus are all being funded through Measure B, the \$109 million school facilities bond passed in 2006 by San Leandro voters. The Arts Education Center, which will also contain a 550-seat theater will be located on the current high school parking lot; and the 9th Grade Campus will be built on the property between Bancroft and East 14th Street and 138th Avenue. Other major construction projects at the high school include a 2,200 sq. ft. expansion of the library, and

a complete renovation of the Career Technology Center.

Work began on the lot Monday, and by Thursday at noon 7,000 cubic yards of dirt—or approximately 200 truckloads—had been transferred a mile away to the site of the old pencil factory and future home of Preferred Freezer. Transferring the dirt to another local construction job was fortuitous and resulted in multiple savings. "We are thinking green," said Measure B Director Mike Murphy. "Our trucks only traveled a short



Measure B Citizens Oversight Committee accepting applications for vacancy — “Taxpayers” representation sought

Deborah Cox, Measure B Citizens Oversight Committee Chair recently announced that the group has a vacancy.

“We need representation on the committee for a person who is active in a bona fide taxpayers’ organization,” she said, explaining that a bona fide taxpayers’ organization is defined as one that represents taxpayers or has a stated concern about the amount of property and other taxes paid by property owners in a given area (as opposed to income tax).

In 2000, voters approved Proposition 39, which amended Article 13A of the Constitution to permit school districts and community college districts to

issue general obligation bonds with the approval of 55% of the voters. Each district which passes a successful Proposition 39 bond is required to create a Citizens Oversight Committee. The purpose of the Citizens Oversight Committee is to “actively review and report on the proper expenditure of taxpayers’ money for school construction.”

In March 2007, the San Leandro Board of Education appointed a Measure B Citizens Oversight Committee.

By law, the Citizens Oversight Committee is required to have a minimum of seven members. This must include:

- A student involved in student government
- A person who is active in a business organization
- A person who is active in a foundation which supports the District
- A person who is active in a senior citizens organizations
- A person who is active in a bona fide taxpayers’ organization

In order to broaden the scope and still have a functioning committee, the Board of Education expanded the committee from the required seven members and approved ten committee seats representing those listed above. Committee members diversely represent the San Leandro community and provide a critical role in keeping the community informed on expenditures and progress of Measure B projects.

“Applications for the vacant position will be accepted until filled,” said Deborah Cox, adding that anyone, regardless of affiliation, who is interested in serving on the Committee should apply, as they will be considered in the event of future vacancies.

Ribbon Cutting: SLUSD’s two oldest schools, McKinley and Washington, celebrate new restrooms at Back-To-School Night
